	<p><i>MORTON BLACKWELL (ON CAMERA): Hello, I'm Morton Blackwell, president of the Leadership Institute, an educational foundation with a mission to identify, recruit, train and place conservatives in politics, government, and the media.</i></p> <p><i>My staff and I have put this video together to explain in detail how socialism, the ideology of the ultra-left, has evolved over time from a voluntary experiment to, at its worst, a coercive form of government that strips people of the rights and liberties that we as Americans enjoy every day.</i></p> <p><i>Many well meaning people are ensnared today because the ultra left, socialist at its base, is active in so wide a variety of causes. It's time for all serious people to study and understand the ultra left, because, despite many setbacks, they still have many skills and they still aspire to power.</i></p> <p><i>Sometimes, for tactical reasons, they conceal what they think and what they want. Often, though, they write or say what they really think and really want. And sometimes those thoughts appear in what they write and say in public.</i></p> <p><i>This presentation will reveal, not always in their</i></p>

	<p><i>own words or in thoughts they would admit, thirty-five things the ultra left really thinks.</i></p> <p><i>Then we'll present, documented in the left's own words, what leftists actually have said and written on these thirty five topics.</i></p> <p><i>Finally for each of the thirty five points, we'll give you contrasting opinions by people who believe in limited government, free enterprise, a strong and independent America, and traditional moral values.</i></p>

	<p>NARRATOR:</p> <p>Let's begin with a story. A story about a place that changed history forever. A place where the ideals of America's founding fathers were finally buried, and a new political order was born. A place where mankind touched heaven, and became divine...</p> <p>Well, that was the idea anyway.</p> <p>Welcome to New Harmony, Indiana. In this small town is preserved a lesson for the ages. Here, nearly two hundred years ago, a community of German colonists built a thriving frontier town. The soil was good. Harvests were large. Craftsmen sold their wares as far away as Philadelphia, New</p>

	<p>York, and New Orleans.</p> <p>When the colonists decided to move on, they sought a buyer for the town of New Harmony. And they found this man: Robert Owen - a British industrialist, social reformer and prophet. Mr. Owen had a vision, and he'd come to America to make it a reality. And so he bought the thriving town of New Harmony - lock, stock and barrel.</p>

	<p>NARRATOR:</p> <p>Owen the prophet sounded the call. Settlers were needed for a great new experiment. Mister Owen had a word for it: Socialism. Private property, he said, must be eliminated forever. Religion must be wiped from the earth. And the traditional social order - marriage, education, entertainment, morality - it all had to be turned upside down.</p>

<p><i>Mental Independence</i>, an oration delivered in the public hall of New Harmony, Indiana, July 4, 1826. Reproduced in the <i>New-Harmony Gazette</i>, vol. 1, no. 42, July 12, 1826:</p> <p>"...man, up to this hour, has been, in all parts of the earth, a slave to a TRINITY of the most monstrous evils that could be combined to inflict mental and physical evil upon his whole race...PRIVATE OR INDIVIDUAL PROPERTY - ABSURD AND IRRATIONAL SYSTEMS OF RELIGION - AND MARRIAGE..."</p>	
	<p>NARRATOR:</p> <p>In 1825, a thousand eager believers joined Owen in New Harmony, vowing to build the new socialist order. Intellectuals and celebrities of the day rushed to heap praise on Owen and his merry band. Newspapers across the world ran fanciful accounts of the experiment. Educators and social reformers came to lend their talents.</p> <p>Then the cheers died down. And the newspapers moved on to the next story. And New Harmony, well, New Harmony slid into comic ruin.</p> <p>It took just two years for socialism to turn this thriving town into a basket case.</p> <p>But if you think that Robert Owen learned a lesson from his experiment, you don't know socialists. Back in</p>

	<p>Britain, Owen built a church of socialism. He appointed bishops of socialism. He wrote hymns to socialism.</p> <p>And socialism became the fastest growing and most destructive religion in all of human history. Like many religions before it, socialism splintered, then splintered again. Democratic socialism. Syndicalism. National socialism. International socialism. Arab socialism. Communism.</p> <p>By 1970, more than half of the world's population lived under one socialist regime or another. And in almost all cases, that meant repression, poverty and woe.</p> <p>Today, citizens of those nations are eagerly embracing economic, political and social freedom -- rejecting the socialist faith they had been fed as a religion.</p> <p>The final tally? Socialist regimes have killed about 150 million people in the past century. They've impoverished billions. Socialism has destroyed the traditional social fabric of countries as divergent as Russia, China and Kenya.</p> <p>So have socialists finally learned from their mistakes? If you think so... well, you don't know socialists.</p>
	<p>NARRATOR:</p> <p>Two hundred years ago, across</p>

	<p>the Indiana frontier, the former colonists had thrived. With good soil, broad rivers and plenty of land, you almost had to try to fail.</p> <p>But fail the socialists did.</p> <p>Robert Owen set out to prove that private property was the root of great evil. His New Harmony settlers learned otherwise. Without the motivation of private reward, everyone fought for the easy jobs. No one could be bothered to break his back in the fields. Young men drank and made merry. Crops went unplanted. Fences were never repaired. The New Harmony residents formed committees to study the problems, but never found the energy to solve them.</p> <p>In the end, they became beggars; pressuring Robert Owen for loans to keep the colony afloat.</p> <p>The complete failure of New Harmony and similar experiments in voluntary socialism persuaded most leftists forever that they <u>had</u> to use coercion, government force, and even terror to achieve their socialist dreams. Voluntary socialism didn't work, and coercive utopians have dominated the left ever since.</p>

That is when there's a market that decides who gets what, then property is put to high value uses. And if you look at... many people trust government. Now if you look at the areas of our lives and you ask the average human being in our country 'what areas are you least satisfied with?' they'll say schools, police services, the post office. Those are the activities run by government. 'What areas of life are you most satisfied with?' they'll say computers, supermarkets, video stores and those are areas that are run by the free market, by capitalist incentives. By people motivated by greed."</p> <p><u>Sound bite, Walter Williams:</u> "In the Soviet Union, so far as the agricultural sector, the Soviet Union allowed their farmers to have a tiny plot behind their house where</p>

	they could grow their own vegetables. These plots consisted of 1% of the soviet farmland, but nonetheless they produced over 30% of agricultural output, which shows you that even in a communist country, when they resort to private property and markets you find success."

	<p>NARRATOR: Politicians of both parties resist tax cuts. When President John F. Kennedy proposed cutting the top U.S. federal income tax rate from a staggering 91 percent, many Republicans opposed the cut, making themselves tax collectors for the welfare state.</p>

<p>Title: Grover Norquist President Americans for Tax Reform</p>	<p><u>Sound bite, Grover Norquist:</u> "We've seen what happens when you increase taxes. The capital gains tax was doubled in 1969 under Nixon and we had the stagflation of the 70s. We saw marginal tax rates cut from 75% to 25% and we had the roaring 20s. Those tax rates were then raised to 75% under Hoover and we had the Great Depression. When tax rates were cut across the board under Kennedy we had the growth of the 60s. When</p>

	tax rates were increased under Nixon and Johnson, both income taxes and capital gain taxes we had the economic slowdown of the 70s. When Reagan cut taxes we had the growth of the 80s.
	<u>Sound Bite, President Reagan:</u> "I feel like we just played the World Series of tax reform -- and the American people won."
	<u>Sound Bite, Grover Norquist:</u> "When Bush raised taxes we had an economic slowdown until the Republicans took the Congress and cut the capital gains tax, then you had strong economic growth again. When you cut marginal tax rates you have more job creation and more wealth creation. When you raise marginal tax rates you have less."
	NARRATOR: Government can create wealth, say socialists. But around the world socialism has meant economic backwardness and poverty. But who are you gonna believe: a well-meaning socialist or your lying eyes?

	<p>NARRATOR: On a spring day in Washington, D.C., in comfortable clothes and well-fed, it's easy to sing the praises of socialism. Its ideology bankrupt, socialism looks more like a snake with a broken back - wounded but dangerous. But the utopian ideas still inspire some. And the days of old can still be glimpsed.</p>
	<p><u>Sound bite, Guy in Bolshevik outfit with Soviet Flag:</u> "We believe in the original ideas the Soviet union was founded on - Marxist Lenin."</p>
	<p>NARRATOR: The glorifying of mob violence. The appeal to rage and embitterment. Here, as in the past, the most radical are cheered, the more moderate ignored. On the fringes, those eager for meaning in life become the pawns of the more radical, who set the standards of behavior. And with the fall of the Berlin Wall and the Soviet Union, a new generation is growing up without real world examples of socialism to judge. So what about those socialist states of the past?</p> <p>Russians suffered through 75 years of socialism. Government controlled every financial decision in the land. Russia's reward? A timeless joke. We pretend to work. They pretend to pay us.</p>

	idea that just because someone works for the government doesn't mean that they aren't interested in expanding their territory and expanding their sphere of influence. When that happens in the private sector that creates jobs. When it happens in government, it creates government. And that's the reason why many of us believe that strictly enforcing the principles of limited government and channeling people's entrepreneurial efforts into the private sector is best for the commonwealth."
	NARRATOR: India embraced socialism for the first 4 decades of its independence. The result? Armies of bureaucrats. Mountains of red tape. And not a productive industry in the land. Like in other parts of the third world, socialism became an excuse, allowing those in power to loot society.

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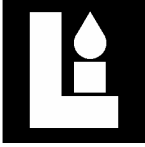
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
